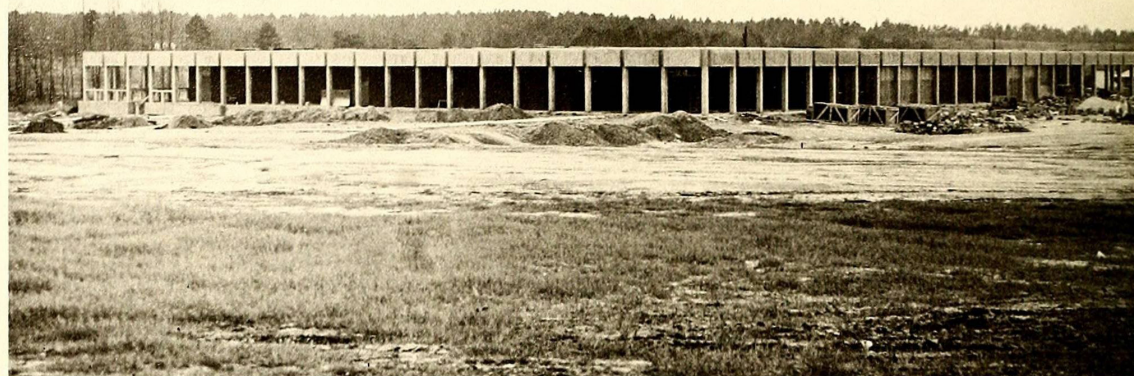

What's New in 2024 at RichmondCC?

It's 2024, and there are some new things happening at Richmond Community College! First of all, as of April 8, you can now register for classes for the entire 2024-2025 Academic Year. This includes the 2024 Fall Semester, 2025 Spring Semester and 2025 Summer Semester.

"This will help our students make sure they are taking the right classes in the right order in order to complete their

degree or diploma in a timely manner. It will also help put in view for them the finish line to graduation," said Vice President for Instruction Kevin Parsons.

University students will also have access to RichmondCC's class schedules for each semester and be able to sign up for classes that will transfer into their degree program.

Next NC Scholarship Rolls Out This Fall Semester

North Carolina students from households making \$80,000 or less could have more than half – if not all – of their tuition and fees covered at Richmond Community College thanks to the new Next NC Scholarship.

Complete FAFSA by Aug. 15!

Eligible North Carolina students attending RichmondCC will receive at least \$3,000 per year. Students with the greatest need for financial aid could qualify for even more funding to help make paying for college more manageable.

Nursing Student Earns Top Academic Award

Second-year Associate Degree Nursing student Payton Chappell of Rockingham has been named Richmond Community College's 2024 Academic Excellence Award winner.

Each college in the N.C. Community College System selects a student for an Academic Excellence Award, which recognizes a student for outstanding academic achievement.

Born and raised in Richmond County, 20-year-old Chappell will graduate with her nursing degree this May. Her dream is to work in intensive care.

"I have always known that I wanted to become a nurse. I enjoy caring for individuals and improving their health and wellness," Chappell said. "Honestly, I've never considered pursuing any career other than nursing because of my desire to help others."

She also has three other family members who graduated from the nursing program at RichmondCC, including her aunt, Lisa Wood.

"My aunt cared for my great-grandfather, Jessie Smith, during his end-of-life transition in 2020. Watching how she

impacted his quality of life made my aspiration to become a nurse even greater," Chappell said.

While a student at Richmond Senior High School, Chappell started working on her career plan. She took advantage of the dual enrollment program with RichmondCC and began taking classes that are prerequisites for the Associate Degree Nursing program. By the time she gradu-

ated high school in 2021, she had only one more year to complete required courses to be able to apply for the nursing program.

"The dual enrollment program gave me a jumpstart on my career, and I would recommend it to all high school students," she said.

Chappell also would recommend RichmondCC's nursing programs because of the instruc-

tors and how prepared she feels to begin her career.

"All the faculty members have served as advocates and mentors for me during my journey," she said. "Although these past two years have been challenging, I feel this program is preparing me to be competent in providing high-quality, safe care to my future patients."

Chappell plans on pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree once she has received her nursing license. She has taken advantage of the college transfer fairs hosted by RichmondCC's Career & Transfer Advising Center to explore her options for an ADN to BSN program at a four-year school.

When she's not immersed in her nursing studies, Chappell enjoys spending time outdoors, including relaxing with a good book or kayaking and fishing with family and friends.

“College students have more options for taking transferable classes at RichmondCC because of the many transfer agreements we have with four-year colleges and universities,” Parsons said. “They can map out classes they would prefer to take at RichmondCC versus their home university and reserve a spot in those classes.”

- Classes for the 2024 Fall Semester start Aug. 14, 2024.
- Classes for the 2025 Spring Semester start Jan. 13, 2025.
- Classes for the 2025 Summer Semester start May 27, 2025.

Students can register for classes over the phone by calling (910) 410-1700 or by meeting in person with a student advisor at either the Hamlet or Scotland County Campus. **Students can also communicate with RichmondCC staff via text message at (910) 518-9685.**

Welding and Machining Offered in New Format to Obtain Needed Skills

When it comes to trades skills, most employers are not interested in those skills coming packaged with a college degree or college diploma. In response, Richmond Community College is changing the way it offers its welding and machining programs.

Welding will now be offered over the course of just two semesters. Students will learn basic welding skills such as SMAW (Stick) Plate, GMAW (Mig) FCAW/Plate and GTAW (TIG) Plate, as well as symbols and specifications.

Once students have completed both sections, Welding I and Welding II, they will be prepared

to obtain certifications from the American Welding Society (AWS). Every AWS certification that a welder earns increases the number of skills needed to perform a wide range of welding jobs.

Machining will also be offered over the course of just two semesters, fall and spring, with the option of additional skills training during the following summer semester. Students will learn basic and advanced machining operations and precision measurement during the two sections of machining offered fall and spring. In the summer, they can round out their knowledge and skills in Advanced Machining II.

Machinists with advanced training have the potential to earn higher wages or get jobs working for high-tech or emerging industries such as aerospace, aviation, medical and renewable energy.

CNAs Can Earn Additional Med. Aide Certification

RichmondCC’s Medication Aide class has now been structured for N.C. Certified Nursing Assistants to become certified as **N.C. Medication Aides**.

The Medication Aide is a valuable and important contributor to the total care of the clients to whom they administer medications. Administering medication is a huge responsibility. The task of medication administration must be approached with a strong sense of responsibility and accountability.

The Medication Aide class is three weeks long and is offered in both the fall and spring semesters at RichmondCC.



To sign up for the Medication Aide class at Richmond Community College, you must be a N.C. Certified Nursing Assistant.

Class is limited to 10 students.

Sign Up Now for 2-Week Course to Work in the Transportation Industry

Richmond Community College will be offering a two-week **Highway Construction Trade Academy** this summer at the Scotland County Campus.

Running July 29 through Aug. 9 from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, the Academy will provide students

with the skills to work in the transportation industry. Training will combine classroom lecture with hands-on, work-based learning for topics such as OSHA 10, flagger, CPR and first aid.

Due to state funding resources, students can enroll in the two-week course at no cost. Only 12 spots are available, so pre-registration is recommended to reserve a spot. Call (910) 410-1700.

Learn Life Skills You Always Wanted to Know

Have you ever thought, "I should know how to do that"? Richmond Community College is now offering a series of classes that will teach you essential life skills that you did not learn in school or just never had the opportunity to learn.

The new Essential Life Skills Series includes one-day classes focusing on a variety of topics such as automotive repairs, cooking, budgeting, sewing, cleaning and other day-to-day life skills. This series targets young adults but is open to anyone. The cost per class is \$40.

• **Essential Life Skills: Kitchen** – Saturday, April 27, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Hamlet Campus

• **Essential Life Skills: Gardening** – Saturday, May 18, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Hamlet Campus

• **Essential Life Skills: Lawn Maintenance** – Saturday, June 8, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Hamlet Campus

• **Essential Life Skills: Sewing** – Saturday, July 20, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Hamlet Campus

Next Steps Providing More Opportunities to Those with Disabilities

Richmond Community College has been selected to be part of a pilot program leading a state effort to provide inclusive post-secondary education leading to employment for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. RichmondCC now offers Next Steps, individualized, job-focused instruction and workforce preparation activities for adults with intellectual disabilities.

For students to qualify for the Next Steps program, they must:

- Be 18 years or older and functioning below the 12th grade level.
- Be able to obtain a valid score on an NRS-approved assessment.
- Be able to meet and agree to enrollment criteria, attendance and conduct policies.

There are three levels to completion, with the third level including on-the-job training, job coaching and potential apprenticeship opportunities.

The scholarship is available for students enrolling in college for the 2024-2025 academic year and is awarded to those who qualify after completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Students planning to attend RichmondCC this fall semester are encouraged to complete the FAFSA by Aug. 15 to ensure they receive all of the Next NC Scholarship funds for which they qualify.

The Next NC Scholarship combines the federal Pell Grant with state-funded financial aid into a simplified, predictable scholarship award that helps make paying for college more manageable for students.

To be eligible for the Next NC Scholarship, students must be:

- A North Carolina resident who is eligible for in-state tuition
- A high school graduate (high school equivalency completers are eligible)
- From a household with an

annual Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of \$80,000 or less

- Enrolled in an eligible undergraduate curriculum program for the 2024-2025 academic year
- Taking at least 6 credit hours per semester (part-time students will receive a partial award)
- Meeting the Satisfactory Academic Progress standards of RichmondCC
- A student who has completed the 2024-2025 FAFSA, with a resulting Student Aid Index (SAI) at or below 7,500 (Once complete, the financial aid office at the college/university they plan to attend will determine and confirm eligibility.)

“We appreciate those working at the state level to make college more accessible and more affordable for N.C. residents,” said Dr. Dale McInnis, President of RichmondCC. “The Next NC Scholarship will help many people achieve their educational and career goals without the burden of college debt following them for years after they graduate.”

For those who do not qualify for the Next NC Scholarship,



N.C. students who are eligible for the Next NC scholarship will receive at least \$3,000 per year at RichmondCC.



RichmondCC offers over 100 scholarships through its Foundation. The Working Student Scholarship is specifically designed to be awarded to those who do not receive federal or state aid.

“Completing the FAFSA is very important because it is required to receive scholarships from the RichmondCC Foundation,” said Director of Financial Aid Emily Jarrell. “Our staff is available to help students complete the FAFSA and explore other grants and scholarship opportunities.”

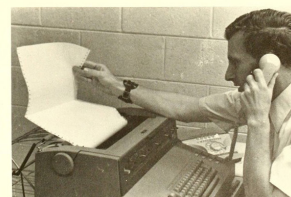
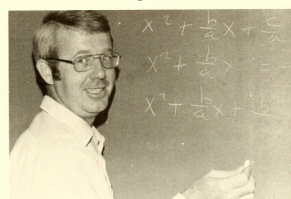

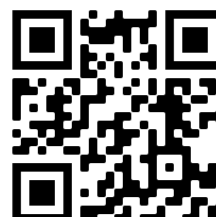
